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1. Council of Governors quarterly meeting on 27 January 2022

Our Council meetings take place quarterly. Our meeting in January was shortened so that our Trust could free up time for our Executives and staff to manage the effects of the Omicron variant of the Covid-19 pandemic. We usually have all our Executive Directors in attendance at our Council meetings. You will find the agenda and meeting papers here on our Trust website, however I just thought it would be useful to draw out a couple of key decisions and items from the last meeting.

- Chairman's reappointment: Due to my interest in this item, David Wilmshurst, Vice-Chair of the Council of Governors took charge for this item. The Council approved the recommendations from the Governors Nominations and Remuneration Committee relating to the Chair remuneration (which would remain at the same level) and approved the Chair Terms and Conditions on reappointment from 1 May 2022. The details about the reappointment will be included in full in the Trust's Annual Report for 2021/22.
- Executive updates: John Holden, Director of Strategy and Integration, Sajid Azeb, Chief Operating Officer and Pat Campbell, Director of HR discussed with Governors;
 - The Omicron variant and the Trust's ability to conduct business as normal
 - Our trust's Inpatient Survey analysis
 - Value for money in the independent sector
 - Compulsory vaccinations for staff

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2. Board of Directors bi-monthly meeting on 10 March 2022

Our Board meetings take place every two months. We held our last one on 10 March. I would though like to highlight a few key items from our last meeting.

Patient Story

At our Board meetings we always start with either a patient story or an in-depth look at one of our Trust services. In March we heard from Barbara and David and I would encourage you to take the opportunity to watch <u>Barbara and David's story</u> which provides insights into their journey at our hospitals during the peak of the Covid pandemic after David had suffered a stroke.





We are pleased that David is recovering well and appreciate the in-depth feedback both Barbara and David provided about their experiences. The video lasts approximately 10 minutes and the discussion at the Board, which is also well worth viewing, lasts approximately 22 minutes and you can watch it here. It starts at 10.22 minutes into the video.

Chief Executive's Report

Outstanding Maternity Services (OMS) Programme: Outstanding Neo-natal Services

In 2019 the Trust was rated as Good overall by the CQC, we did though have some improvements to make to our Maternity Services. Since January 2020 our Board has routinely received highly detailed reports on our maternity services and been witness to the improvements underway to


move us towards 'outstanding'. At this meeting we welcomed members of the Neo-natal team who outlined how they are starting their improvement journey within the framework of the OMS programme.



This is an important development, particularly bearing in mind that we are the youngest city in Europe, there are approximately 6,000 babies born here every year and we have areas of significant deprivation in Bradford. 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
3. Governor Elections Process Underway with Search for Nominees



You will have been in receipt of emails promoting our current elections process which launched on 7 March.

Our election nomination process is now well underway and will close on Monday 4 April 2022. 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4. Special Briefing from Professor John Wright, Director of Research

As a teaching hospital, research is a core activity and we have over 500 research projects taking place across the Trust. In this edition, I am grateful to John Wright our Director of Research, who shines a spotlight on some of the research activity that has taken place over the last 12 months and how this research is impacting and improving the health and wellbeing of our Bradford population and beyond.



During the pandemic some of the Trust's research activity was paused and our research delivery staff were redeployed to work on Urgent Public Health COVID-19 studies. Although still supporting some COVID-19 related research work most of our 'normal' pre-pandemic research activity has resumed and between April and December 2021 over 8,500 research participants have been recruited into our research studies.

Born in Bradford

Born in Bradford is an internationally recognised research programme which aims to find out what keeps families healthy and happy. We use this information to work with the local authority, health, education and voluntary sector providers across Bradford district to develop, implement and evaluate ambitious programmes to improve population health. We have a vast 'city of research' infrastructure which includes detailed health and wellbeing information on Bradfordians enrolled in our three birth cohort studies and a connected routine dataset of health, social care and education data for over 700,000 citizens living in Bradford and Airedale. We host a range of initiatives to improve health working with the local authority, health, education, cultural and voluntary sector providers. These include the Better Start Bradford Innovation Hub, Bradford Inequalities Research, the Healthy Families theme of the Yorkshire and Humber Applied Research Collaboration, Connected Bradford, Join Us: Move Play, the LEAP and various other externally funded applied health research studies. In January the BiB team were delighted to announce the launch of their new Age of Wonder study, capturing the journey from adolescence into adulthood of up to 30,000 Bradford schoolchildren. With £7million funding from the Wellcome Trust to deliver the seven-year project, the Age of Wonder research team will:

- Work alongside young people aged 13 19 to explore wide-ranging topics such as physical and mental wellbeing, and health and social inequalities – and capturing information via surveys in school.
- Collect measurements and biological samples from students in year 9 to give an insight into the physical health of young people in the district, and shape service improvements to tackle systemic health issues such as diabetes and obesity.
- Collaborate with almost 40 secondary schools to embed the research into the curriculum, and to inspire more young people into STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) subjects, digital technologies and the Arts, as well as create new opportunities for skills building.



Evidence from BiB has already helped to uncover the harm of air pollution, the impact of people's diet and exercise, how the urban environment affects health, and the early causes of diabetes and heart disease. It has also been used to develop new treatments and polices to protect children's health, and raise much-needed, multi-million pound investment into the district. Age of Wonder will build on this platform and is committed to sharing its findings widely, particularly with Bradford Council and the Department for Education, to improve young people's health and life chances.



Our Ageing and Stroke research team's Professor Andy Clegg, with colleagues from Leeds, Liverpool and Manchester, has won a NIHR Artificial Intelligence in Multiple Long-Term Conditions research grant award. This £3M award aims to help reduce overprescribing in primary care. Professor Clegg with colleagues is also leading a project to explore digital and remote enhancements for the assessment and management of older people living with frailty.

This last year has also seen the HERO trial successfully achieve its recruitment target of 743. This

project is evaluating the clinical and cost effectiveness of a home-base exercise programme for older people with frailty after discharge from hospital. Further information regarding the trial design and prior pilot work can be found at:

LUNS Questionnaire

A simple and reliable method for identifying longer term unmet needs after stroke.

Our longer-term unmet needs assessment tool (LUNS) to assist identifying stroke patients' needs at individual and service level (LUNS Team, Forster, 2013) continues to be rolled out internationally. To date there is a published translation in Dutch (Groeneveld et al., 2017), and researchers in Portugal, France, Korea and China and many more are undertaking translation. In most recent development, the preliminary data from the Korean translated version of the tool shows good validity and reliability. Colleagues in English speaking countries are also using the tool to assess and improve their stroke services.

Quality and Safety research

Our Quality and Safety research team have just submitted an application for renewal of the Patient Safety Translational Research Centres funding (www.yhpstrc.org). This is one of only three patient safety research centres in the country, so it is a very prestigious award and worth up to £7million.

One of the many Q&S team's project 'PFI-SII' is well underway and aims to improve how patients

and families are involved in investigations after they experience a serious healthcare incident. To understand how patients and families are currently involved in such investigations and what needs to change, the PFI-SII team analysed NHS Trust serious incident investigation policies, published research, and spoke to over 50 patients, families, NHS staff and lawyers. For the past six months the team have drawn upon these findings to co-design, with a large community of stakeholders, new processes and resources to guide more meaningful involvement of patients and families. Over the next year, they will be testing these processes and resources within our five partner organisations, including BTHFT, across 25 investigations, to understand their impact



upon experience, learning and likelihood of seeking legal recourse.

Improvement Academy

Published in early January, the Improvement Academy's latest report details **NHS staff experiences of working under prolonged intense pressure**, alongside four offers of support designed to respond to immediate need and learn new ways to help.



NIHR National Patient Recruitment Centre: Bradford

Our PRC is one of five regionally based PRCs funded through a £7m investment as part of the Government's Life Sciences Industrial Strategy and Sector Deal 2 - a series of measures to strengthen the UK environment for clinical research.

The PRC initiative aims to make it quicker and easier for life science companies to deliver late-phase clinical research at pace and scale through the NHS. In turn, they will increase the number of commercial studies that can be delivered within the UK – this benefits our patients who will gain earlier access to innovative new treatments and diagnostics, as well as the NHS and wider economy by attracting additional investment from the global life science industry. Our PRC team has continued to lead the delivery of the Novavax vaccine trial in Bradford; the work on this trial has been extremely intensive and time consuming. 726 participants were recruited and in this last year there have been numerous follow up visits, surveillance visits and data queries.



One of the current PRC studies is the PERTUSSIS trial which is a paediatric study evaluating a new vaccine for the prevention of pertussis more commonly known as whooping cough, a childhood disease which affects the lungs and breathing tubes. Usually children receive their last whooping cough booster at the age of three, and this is given by injection. This trial will see children having a further booster dose and this will be intranasal, i.e. given via the nose which is much less invasive for

City of Research launched

Last year to encourage more volunteers from across Bradford, Airedale and Craven to sign up to take part in research our City of Research registry was launched. Led by the Trust with the other main NHS organisation in the district - Airedale NHS Foundation Trust; Bradford District Care NHS Foundation Trust; and Bradford District and Craven Clinical Commissioning Group - the initiative is spearheaded by a website which offers a digital doorway into all the growing opportunities and studies that the district's home-grown research talent is leading.











By joining the research registry, people can choose from many different ways in which they can contribute to and take part in our research – from clinical trials of current or new treatments, to taking part in questionnaires or focus groups to testing medical equipment. 
