

Contraception options after having a baby

Where can I get contraception from?

It is important to think about contraception from the start if you do not want to become pregnant again very soon after the birth of your baby.

Speak to your midwife, health visitor, GP or your local contraception clinic.

Options which can be used any time after birth

Contraceptive Implant	More than 99% effective	Lasts 3 years	No		
Contraceptive Injection	More than 99% effective when used correctly	Lasts 8 to 13 weeks	No		
Male Condoms	More than 98% effective if used correctly	Single use	Yes		
Female Condoms	95% effective if used correctly	Single use	Yes		
Progesterone Only Pill	More than 99% effective when taken correctly		No		
Natural Family Planning (Fertility Awareness) Keeping record of fertility signs	If used according to teaching and instructions, fertility awareness methods are up to 99% effective, depending on the method used		No		
Intrauterine Device (IUD) T-Shaped plastic & Copper Coil	More than 99% effective	Lasts 5 to 10 years	No		
Intrauterine System (IUS) T-Shaped plastic Coil*	More than 99% effective	Lasts 3 to 5 years	No		

STIs = Sexually Transmitted Infections

^{*} Can be inserted within 48 hours of the birth. If not inserted within 48 hours, you'll usually be advised to wait until four weeks after the birth.

Contraceptive Type	How effective is it %	How long it lasts	Protects against STIs		
Combined Pill - Contains Oestrogen & Progesterone Can start 3-6 weeks after birth depending on breastfeeding	More than 99% effective when taken correctly		No		
Contraceptive Patch Can use 3-6 weeks after birth dependant on breastfeeding	When used correctly more than 99% effective	Each patch lasts one month	No		
Vaginal Ring A small soft, plastic ring that you place inside your vagina	More than 99% effective if used correctly	Lasts one month	No		

From six weeks after birth					
Contraceptive Type	How effective is it %	How long it lasts	Protects against STIs		
Diaphragm or Cap	When used correctly with spermicide 92-96% reliable	Single use	No
